Accelerating What's Next

For more than 150 years—and more than 75 of them in San Antonio—Trinity University has supported the community it calls home. With more than 7,500 alumni in the Alamo City, the University continues to have a profound influence on the San Antonio community.

Trinity is poised to become a nationally recognized liberal arts and sciences university. Experiencing unprecedented momentum in enrollment, Trinity University continues to strengthen the value of its degree and its place in San Antonio. The University is committed to attracting and retaining the best and brightest, enabling access to education for all students. Trinity is prepared to accelerate what's next.

Improving K-12 Education

Trinity faculty and students work directly with San Antonio Independent School District students and teachers, as well as with nearly 20 other public school districts and many private academies in the San Antonio area.

Trinity University is committed to the community and is deeply rooted in its pursuit to create tomorrow's leaders. Trinity's Department of Education activities include:

- The graduation of nearly **60 masters-prepared teachers** annually who complete the University's programs in school administration, school psychology, and teaching each year. They are in high demand, and many go to work immediately in San Antonio classrooms;
- **The Principal Fellows Program**—developing a select group of high-performing, entrepreneurial, transformative K-12 leaders who dramatically improve the levels of student achievement and aspiration in the San Antonio community;
- **The Superintendents' Forum**—bringing together superintendents from area school districts to discuss pressing issues, and to interact with local business, community and philanthropic leaders;
- **The Upward Bound Program, Saturday Morning Experience, and College Advising Corps**—mentoring and advising K-12 students to increase college access and readiness; and
- **The Trinity Prize for Excellence in Teaching**—awarded annually to recognize and encourage outstanding teachers in the region.

Innovating Through Change



██████████ (right) is one of many Trinity students who are matched with San Antonio tech companies through Students+Startups.

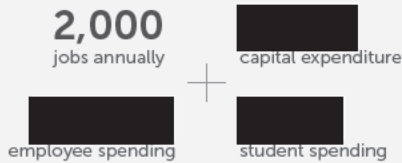
Because Trinity values passion and imagination as much as academic success, students are encouraged to find ways to put their good ideas to work.

The **Students+Startups** program—a collaboration between Trinity University, the nonprofit 80/20 Foundation, and San Antonio coworking community Geekdom—recruits high-caliber talent so they can start their careers with local startup companies.

Trinity's Entrepreneurship program launched the **Stumberg Venture Competition** in 2015, which has since handed out more than

\$██████████ in seed money to more than 20 startups. In total, Trinity entrepreneurs have founded 44 startups, with 29 still active, including Coldeclara, an online platform that helps Colombians navigate their country's challenging tax system, and Quick Sip Coffee, a specialty cold brew that is brewed, manufactured, and bottled in San Antonio.

Trinity University's Economic Impact



In 2018, Trinity's economic impact was estimated at \$271 million per year in a study conducted by the Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas. The study concluded that Trinity supports more than 2,000 jobs annually, spends [redacted] on capital expenditures, triggers spending by employees of [redacted] and by students of [redacted] in addition to other impact from university purchases and visitor spending.

Since 1996, Trinity University faculty members have conducted more than 40 studies of the economic impact of San Antonio's major industries for the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce and other organizations.

Elf Louise Christmas Project founder Louise Locker has delivered toys to more than a million children since 1969 when she was just a first-year student at Trinity. During the Christmas season, more than 4,500 volunteers gather to wrap gifts and deliver toys to children across Bexar County.

As founding members of cloud computing giant Rackspace, Elmendorf and Condon have played a major role in San Antonio's booming tech and startup scene. Condon also acts as a mentor to rising area entrepreneurs through several international venture firms.

Addressing Urban Challenges

It's said that in 10 years, the population of Texas will look like the population of San Antonio, and that in 20 years the population of the United States will also have shifted toward this city's demographics. Trinity's Urban Studies program has forged relationships in the diversified public and private sectors across San Antonio, and interns with the Arts, Letters, and Enterprise program have invested their time and talent in these and other organizations:

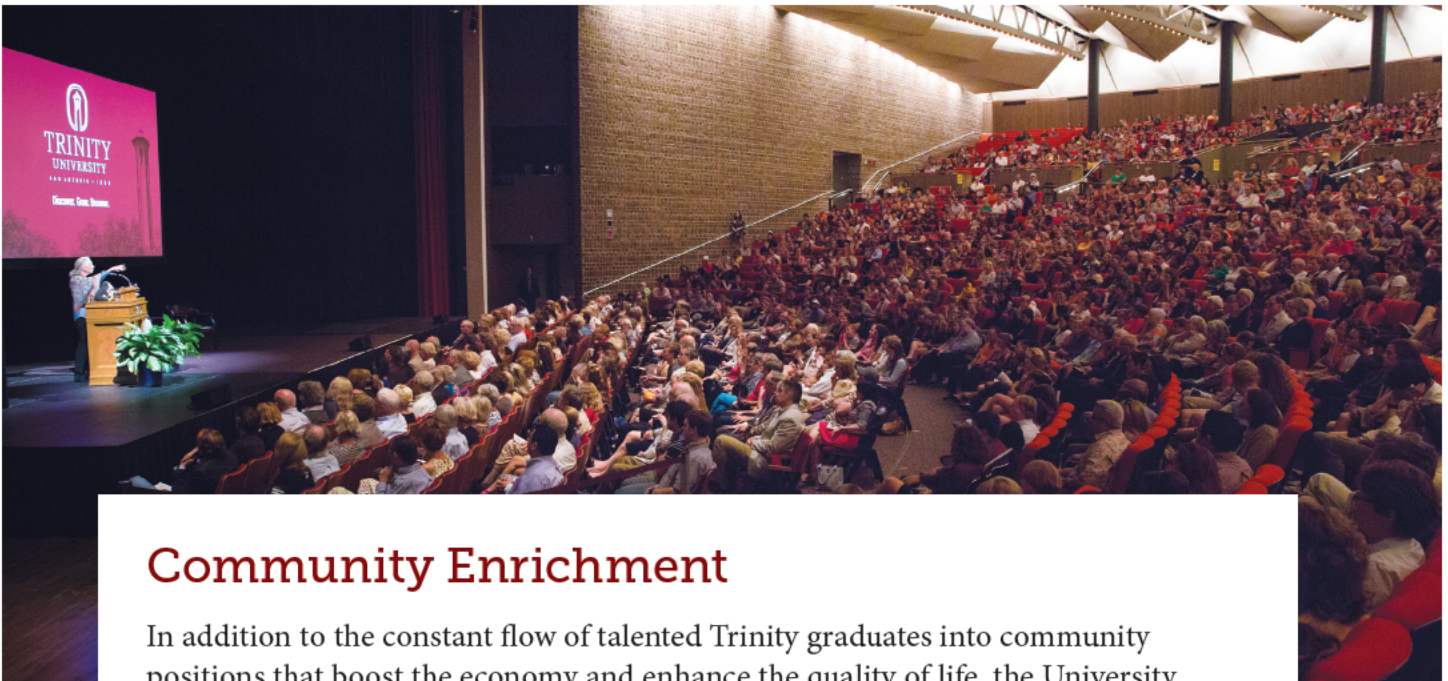


Trinity students and faculty conduct valuable research, often benefiting nonprofit organizations that may lack the knowledge, expertise, or time to devote to it. Recent community-based studies include:

- an inventory and map of the business activity for San Antonio for Growth on the Eastside;
- an analysis and comparison of water consumption rates between residential, commercial, and industrial land uses for the San Antonio Water System; and
- research for the San Antonio Eastside Promise Neighborhood (included administering focus groups, analyzing data, and preparing reports and presentations).

Higher education and public entities can collaborate on creating a unified approach in creating strategic plans to revitalize sections of the city economically and socially. With support from a Promise Neighborhood Grant from the U.S. Department of Education and a Choice Neighborhoods grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Trinity is partnering with several public entities on the revitalization of the Dignowity Hill neighborhood, including:

- The City of San Antonio
- The United Way of San Antonio and Bexar County
- San Antonio Housing Authority
- VIA Metropolitan Transit



Community Enrichment

In addition to the constant flow of talented Trinity graduates into community positions that boost the economy and enhance the quality of life, the University offers year-round opportunities for community members to experience:

- free public lectures by world-renowned figures
- musical events and plays
- art exhibits
- sporting events
- religious services
- student-operated jazz radio station KRTU 91.7 FM
- public forums
- access to the nationally recognized Coates Library and its Special Collections

Lectures by national and world leaders include the Distinguished Lecture Series, which has hosted the former Presidents of Mexico and Pakistan, former Prime Ministers, and others; the Flora Cameron Lectures on Politics and Public Affairs; the Distinguished Scientists Lectures; the DeCoursey Lecture Series, the Nobel Economists Lecture Series, the Lennox Lecture Series, the Stieren Arts Enrichment Series, and others.

Recognition and Rankings

Trinity consistently draws attention to the city through its rankings among the top small liberal arts and sciences institutions in the nation. Recent recognition includes:



The *Wall Street Journal* has ranked Trinity as the No. 37 liberal arts institution and the No. 100 college in the nation in 2019.



According to *U.S. News & World Report*, Trinity remains the top institution in Texas and No. 1 overall for regional universities in the West.



Trinity has reached the No. 61 spot in the nation in College Consensus' annual Best Colleges and Universities rankings.



Princeton Review ranked Trinity No. 11 in the nation in 2019 in their Best Science Lab Facilities category.



Trinity ranked No. 1 in Texas and No. 26 in the nation for Alumni Employment Rates per the U.S. Department of Education's College Scorecard.



Trinity ranks No. 33 in the nation by *College Consensus* for most supportive alumni networks.

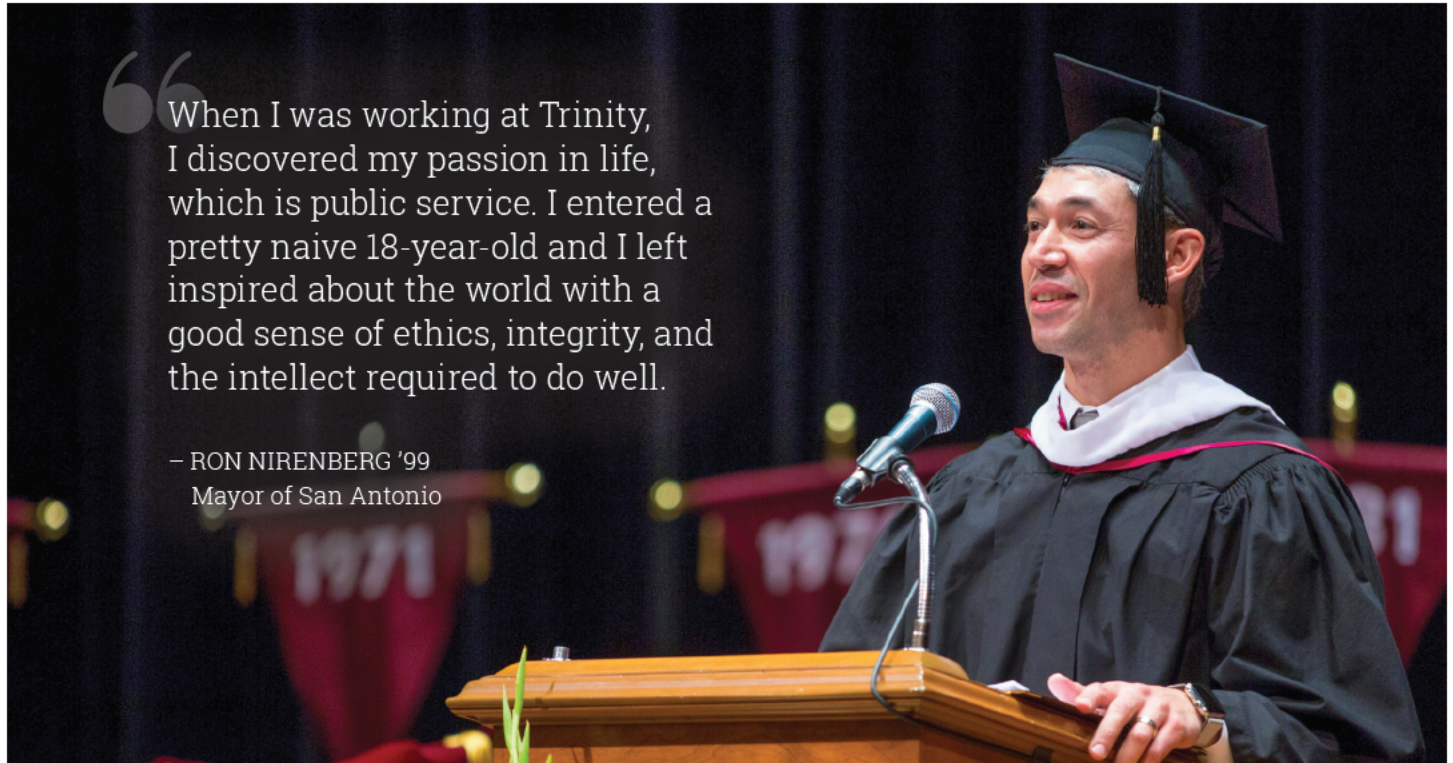
